



## Conference „A Ukrainian example? Future support systems”

**June 5-6, 2023 - Berlin Global Village | Am Sudhaus 2 | 12053 Berlin**

Due to the Russian war of aggression against Ukraine we are currently experiencing the greatest forced migration movement in Europe since World War II. Millions of people, including children and youth, are fleeing from the war, among other countries, to Germany.

Professionals in reception processes, youth support services as well as in the healthcare system are therefore facing challenges, some of which are new, others which reflect structural problems which have already existed for years. At the same time, the current situation makes apparent which potential arises when societal and legal conditions allow for quick and unbureaucratic support and when self-organized support systems as well as the resources of a supportive civil society are integrated.

During the two-day conference we aim to make visible the experiences of young persons from Ukraine and the professionals who support them within reception processes, youth support services and the healthcare system in Germany, show the potential of and need for action regarding the creation of needs-oriented support structures in reception processes, youth support services and the healthcare system and bring these together with the perspectives of professionals working in the field, self-organizations and political as well as administrative decision-makers. At a more general level it will be addressed which differences are present in comparison to past forced migration movements, which inequalities accompany the current situation and what decision-makers can and should learn for the future.
